As pastor, I am especially grateful for the great support the parish has long provided for our own school, and I am indebted to our Jacob Allstott, Chris Gates, and the excellent faculty and staff who make our school the wonderful place of social, academic, and spiritual formation that it is. As it says on our school letterhead, we've been "forming disciples of Christ since 1926." What a great legacy of faith we have!

Lansing Catholic High School

We are grateful to be able to partner with LCHS, and ask for God's continued blessings upon the excellent team the Lord has called to serve us and families from around the Lansing area. What was originally was "Gabriels High School" is still *our Catholic High School*. Not just ours, of course. It draws from all the area parishes.

Special Masses This Week and Ursula Klein Concert

Because this is Catholic Schools Week, we will add morning Masses on Tuesday and Wednesday at 8:15 a.m. Saturday evening, February 4, at 6:30 p.m., we will have a memorial concert honoring the legacy of music, and the long-time service of Ursula Klein. The concert will be in the church, with a reception in Mercy Hall afterward.

"Learning in Wartime" Excerpts

At the Sunday Masses last week, I shared these two paragraphs. I offer them for your review. It's from a lecture by C.S. Lewis, which was given on October 22, 1939 in St. Mary the Virgin Church in Oxford. Here are the excerpts:

Perhaps it may be useful to mention the three mental exercises which may serve as defenses against the three enemies which war raises up against the scholar. The first enemy is excitement -- the tendency to think and feel about the war when we had intended to think about our work. The best defense is a recognition that in this, as in everything else, the war has not really raised up a new enemy but only aggravated an old one. There are always plenty of rivals to our work. We are always falling in love or quarreling, looking for jobs or fearing to lose them, getting ill and recovering, following public affairs. If we let ourselves, we shall always be waiting for some distraction or other to end before we can really get down to our work. The only people who achieve much are those who want knowledge so badly that they seek it while the conditions are still unfavorable. Favorable conditions never come. There are, of course, moments when the pressure of the excitement is so great that any superhuman self-control could not resist it. They come both in war and peace. We must do the best we can.

The second enemy is frustration -- the feeling that we shall not have time to finish. If I say to you that no one has time to finish, that the longest human life leaves a man, in any branch of learning, a beginner, I shall seem to you to be saying something quite academic and theoretical. You would be surprised if you knew how soon one begins to feel the shortness of the tether: of how many things, even in middle life, we have to say "No time for that", "Too late now", and "Not for me". But Nature herself forbids you to share that experience. A more Christian attitude, which can be attained at any age, is that of leaving futurity in God's hands. We may as well, for God will certainly retain it whether we leave it to Him or not. Never, in peace or war, commit your virtue or your happiness to the future. Happy work is best done by the man who takes his long-term plans somewhat lightly and works from moment to moment "as to the Lord". It is only our daily bread that we are encouraged to ask for. The present is the only time in which any duty can be done or any grace received. . . . [I'm adding to this the concluding paragraph of the lecture below.] . . Yet war does do something to death. It forces us to remember it. The only reason why the cancer at sixty or the paralysis at seventy-five do not bother us is that we forget them. War makes death real to us, and that would have been regarded as one of its blessings by most of the great Christians of the past. They thought it good for us to be always aware of our mortality. I am inclined to think they were right. All the animal life in us, all schemes of happiness that centred in this world, were always doomed to a final frustration. In ordinary times only a wise man can realise it. Now the stupidest of us knows. We see unmistakably the sort of universe in which we have all along been living, and must come to terms with it. If we had foolish un-Christian hopes about human culture, they are now shattered. If we thought we were building up a heaven on earth, if we looked for something that would turn the present world from a place of pilgrimage into a permanent city satisfying the soul of man, we are disillusioned, and not a moment too soon. But if we thought that for some souls, and at some times, the life of learning, humbly offered to God, was, in its own small way, one of the appointed approaches to the Divine reality and the Divine beauty which we hope to enjoy hereafter, we can think so still.

In light of this lecture, we do well to always remember our own impending death, however remote it might be, with the goal of living well each and every day. And let us, indeed, never defer our virtue or our happiness, but seek always to make the most of every moment the Lord has graciously given us.


