St. John Paul II, Pray for us!

Today (October 22), when it is not a Sunday, the Memorial of Pope St. John Paul II. His pontificate was (and remains) a great gift to the Church and to the world. As the Synod on Synodality continues, I take great consolation in the Encyclical that St. John Paul II wrote in 1993, thirty years ago. The title of the encyclical was *Veritatis Splendor*, which means "The Splendor of Truth." As the discussion of a review and potential change to the application of sexual morality seems to be ongoing at the Synod, this paragraph from the Encyclical *Veritatis Splendor* is particularly relevant and reassuring:

81. In teaching the existence of intrinsically evil acts, the Church accepts the teaching of Sacred Scripture. The Apostle Paul emphatically states: "Do not be deceived: neither the immoral, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor sexual perverts, nor thieves, nor the greedy, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor robbers will inherit the Kingdom of God" (1 Cor 6:9-10).

If acts are intrinsically evil, a good intention or particular circumstances can diminish their evil, but they cannot remove it. They remain "irremediably" evil acts; per se and in themselves they are not capable of being ordered to God and to the good of the person. "As for acts which are themselves sins (cum iam opera ipsa peccata sunt), Saint Augustine writes, like theft, fornication, blasphemy, who would dare affirm that, by doing them for good motives (causis bonis), they would no longer be sins, or, what is even more absurd, that they would be sins that are justified?".134 Consequently, circumstances or intentions can never transform an act intrinsically evil by virtue of its object into an act "subjectively" good or defensible as a choice.

Becoming and Living As the New Man


Last Sunday, I preached about the wedding garment, which is the active embrace of the baptismal garment that each of us received, and were at that time exhorted to "keep it unstained by sin." Some of the quotes I shared last weekend I include here for your review: In Ephesians, too, the same image appears: "Put on ($\acute{e}v\delta\upsilon\sigma\acute{a}\mu \epsilon voi$) the new man who has been created in God's image—in righteousness and holiness that comes from truth" (Eph 4:24, NET). This phrase "the new man" ($\tau \delta v \varkappa \alpha \iota v \delta v \mathring{a} v \theta \varrho \omega \pi ov$) is highly relevant to our passage, which says that "the king saw a man"

there (είδεν έχει άνθρωπον) not dressed in a wedding garment." Whereas the Father of the Bridegroom came looking for the New Man in his guests—that is, a living reflection of his beloved Son—what he found in this case was the persistence of the decrepit old man. Here again Paul stresses the theme of renewal in the image of God, imprinted in man's being at his creation. However, in this context "God's image" has acquired a very concrete and personal content because it is another way of referring to the God-man Jesus Christ, "who is the likeness of God" (2 Cor 4:4). Thus, man's rebirth through baptism leads him simultaneously backward, to recapitulate the lost image of his first origin, and forward, to become conformed to the fullness of God's design for man as embodied in Christ as sole and universal Archetype: "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on ($\dot{\epsilon}v\delta\dot{v}\sigma\alpha\sigma\theta\epsilon$) Christ" (Gal 3:27). Judging from this rich and frequent Pauline witness, we must retain the image of becoming clothed with Christ as central to the theology of Christian transformation. Leiva, Erasmo. And, as I said, Colossians 3 is a great summary of what it takes to be a disciple, and how to work on becoming and living consistently as the "New Man" we were all called and gifted to be in Christ:

Colossians 3:11f then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. 2Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. 3For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. 4When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory. 5Put to death, then, the parts of you that are earthly: immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and the greed that is idolatry. 6Because of these the wrath of God is coming [upon the disobedient]. 7By these you too once conducted yourselves, when you lived in that way. 8But now you must put them all away: anger, fury, malice, slander, and obscene language out of your mouths. 9Stop lying to one another, since you have taken off the old self with its practices 10 and have put on the new self, which is being renewed . . . in the image of its creator.
